

Two Steps to a MLA Works Cited Entry

First, a rationale and answer to the age old question “Why oh why do I have to do this?”

Remember the readings on the importance of soft skills?

Carefully following written directions on an admittedly tedious task is part and parcel of knowledge based work – the kind of careers most of you are in college for. Another name for this ability? A soft skill.

And the ability to follow instructions has far ranging ramifications.

My wife works in a hospital lab and she regularly notes that following very specific – and admittedly tedious – directions lie at the center of accurate testing.

Accurate testing? That’s what keeps you and me alive.

Granted, staying alive and correctly writing a MLA works cited entry is a stretch.

What’s not a stretch is that for most of us, slowing down and paying close attention is a soft skill that needs more development.

Get ready to get developed.

Two steps to Works Cited Entries

- 1) Determine kind of source you’re working with: for our purposes, these include
 - a. Book (Delbanco)
 - b. Article in a database (Menand)
 - c. Article in an online newspaper or magazine (Kristoff, Kahlenberg, “What is College For?”)
 - d. Article/source from a website (Hart Associates)
 - e. Article from a print newspaper or magazine.
 - f. Single essay/story in a book (this would be called “Work In An Anthology”)
- 2) Using either your handbook (*Little Seagull* starting on page 110) or the [Perdue Owl Link](#), find the corresponding example and complete using the example as a reference.
 - a. Specific links to Perdue OWL examples

 - ii. MLA Works Cited Page: [Periodicals](#) [Print]
 - iii. MLA Works Cited Page: [Electronic Sources](#) (this means most web sources)
