In Bobby Ann Mason's "Shiloh" she is <u>making a statement</u> NEED A CLEARER ARGUMENT ABOUT THE ROLE OF WOMEN about the role of women in modern day relationships. Women can now effectively run a household as the breadwinner, gender roles are no longer clearly defined in a relationship, and that marrying someone <u>you knocked up</u><<A BIT TOO INFORMAL is an outdated and archaic practice. <<TAKE ANOTHER LOOK AT THE QUESTION. NEED A CLEARER ARGUMENT: A POINT YOU CAN GO BACK TO

In "A Rose for Emily" Southern aristocracy is dying a slow painful death. THIS IS SHOWN BY _____, ____. << NEED TO LIST DIVISIONS where its last example is a crazy woman who is put on a pedestal by the people of the town so they can hold on to the ways of the past.

The admiration of Alice Walker to the contentiousness of family's traditions in "Everyday Use" << CLARIFY THAT YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT WALKER'S VIEW OF HERITAGE. WHAT IS HER VIEW OF HERITAGE. is indicated by her choosing to name the story as she did, making Dee an unsavory character, and awarding the quilts to Maggie at the end of the story.

In Bobbie Ann Manson's "Shiloh", she demonstrates that modern-day relationships << CLARIFY THAT YOU'LL BE EXAMINING PROBLEMS IN RELATIONSHIPS. need to be able to spend time together << THIS COULD WORK AS A DIVISION; knowing who you live with is critical.

In the story Gimpel the Fool, did bullying force Gimpel into believing thing that were not true or was it <u>his optimistic attitude</u><<MIGHT BE A DIVISION that allowed him to convince his self of falsehoods.<<<CLARIFY ARGUMENT: GIMPEL IS NOT A FOOL.

The definition of a fool is someone who lacks good sense or judgment. In the story Gimpel The Fool,<<QUOTATION MARKS Gimpel shows no signs of someone having these traits, in fact it is the exact opposite. Gimpel is not a fool because Gimpel does not speak nor act like other the townsfolk<<HAVE TO SET UP THE TOWNSFOLK AS FOOLS, he is the most successful person in town and finally his most intellectual quality against foolishness is his ego<<REALLY CLEVER. "It is written, better to be a fool all your days than for one hour to be evil. You are not a fool. They are the fools. For who causes his neighbor to feel shame loses paradise himself" (301) If the townfolk looked at these traits they would see, Gimpel is no fool.

Bobbie Ann Mason suggests that the modern day relationshipS AREis isolating, just like how Norma Jean isolated Leeroy<<LEROY in "Shiloh"<<NEED ADDITIONAL DIVISIONS. IF YOU CAN'T DEVELOP THEM, CHANGE THESIS/ARGUMENT

In Mason's "Shiloh," the author suggests that modern-day relationships are complicated and dull<<MAYBE SHIFT TO THESE TWO FACTORS CAUSING PROBLEMS? ACTUALLY, CAN YOU NARROW DOWN TO ONE? – OR, SAY THAT THERE ARE MANY PROBLEMS, INCLUDING COMPLICATIONS, DULLNESS? by reversing the gender roles in the characters<<SORRY, NOT SURE THIS IS GOING TO WORK, giving Leroy and Norma very little in common, and by making it difficult for Leroy to bring up the dead marriage to Norma Jean<<CAN YOU DEVELOP A BROADER POINT HERE? THIS READS MORE LIKE AN EXAMPLE THAT COULD BE USED IN A PARAGRAPH.

Norma Jean in Manson's << CORRECT NAME "Shiloh" shows that her strength is the gender role reversal in the story by her trying to build her body by lifting weights, attending night school to further her education, and being the only one in the relationship that works. << TAKE ANOTHER LOOK AT THE QUESTION

Carver defines redemption as the <u>understanding of life through someone else's perspective</u><<THIS COULD BE A DIVISION.<CLARIFY ARGUMENT. CONVEY THAT YOU'LL BE EXAMINING WHAT CHARACTERS NEED TO ACHIEVE REDEMPTION.

In the story Shiloh<<QUOTATION MARKS the writer uses gender role reversal with the character Norma to show her independence, how she can be self-sufficient, and to show her physical and mental capabilities.<<TOO CLOSE TO THE BODY PARAGRAPH. TAKE ANOTHER LOOK AT THE OUESTION.

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In "A Rose for Emily" William Faulkner depicts the degradation of the southern aristocracy. This is shown by the state of decay Miss Emily's home and it's surrounding neighborhood are in, the attitudes and behavior the townspeople show towards Miss Emily, and Miss Emily's own attitudes towards the townspeople and her aversion to change << THIS ONE MIGHT FIT INTO ANOTHER DIVISION. << GOOD START. American society could be recognized as the underlying issue behind the story "A&P" by Updike considering he is criticizing how drone and brainwashed the people in the store are, relating them back to America, and the way Americans act.<<CLARIFY THE CRITIQUE: WHAT IS HE CRITIQUING SINGULAR: THEN DIVISIONS ARE HOW IT'S SHOWN. OR WHAT ARE HIS THREE CRITQUES (DIVISIONS)?

Mason's Leroy and Norma Jean in "Shiloh" pick at the obvious flaws in modern-day relationships by dropping subtle hints, such as Leroy's << MIGHT BE TOO SPECIFIC TO THE STORY: LIMITS lack of communication, >>>a job, and motivation. << GOOD IDEAS: SMOOTH OUT THE WORDING.

In >>QUOTATION MARK'A Rose for Emily" William Faulkner is saying that aristocracy in the south is dying. Emily Grierson dying, the once prosperous street, now vacant, has only Emily's house left, and slavery dying out all support that aristocracy in the south is withering on a vine.<<NEED TO TRIM THE VINE (COUGH COUGH). TIGHTEN THE WORDING. LOVE THE DIVISIONS

Gimpel is indeed not a fool with much proof, you see in the story that he is very much intelligent, strong and a heavyy<,KIND? hearted<<NOT SURE WHAT YOU MEAN HERE? young man but he is far from a fool.<<CLARIFY WORDING
